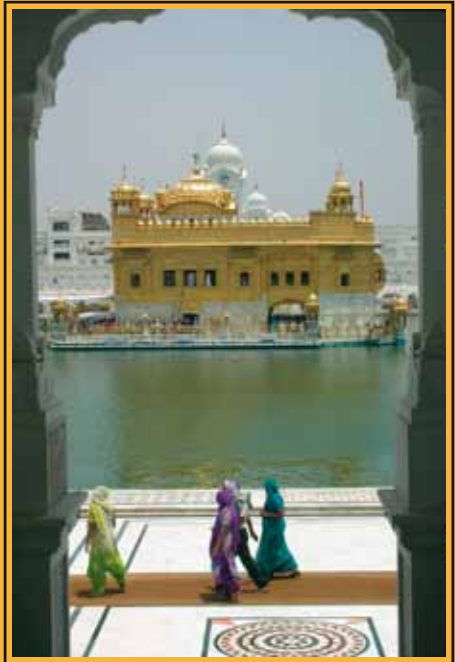

COMPOSER FRANCIS CHAGRIN

'Rumanian by birth, British by nationality and cosmopolitan by inclination.' Actor Nicolas Chagrin presents a portrait of his father – and reveals how his musical talent skipped a generation to re-emerge in Nicolas's daughter, Alyusha. Francis Chagrin's musical education took place in Paris, playing in night clubs and studying under Nadia Boulanger – but rumours of war drove him to settle in Britain in 1936. Chagrin wrote chamber music & orchestral music – and was elected Film Composer of the Year in 1963. Activities Running Throughout the Month: **Anne Frank** [+ you]

Radio Salaam Shalom song writing project. Bristol Cathedral.

Radio Salaam Shalom plans to commission a London-based Jewish-Muslim hip-hop duo, Lines of Faith, to develop a song about Anne Frank's message for young people today. Visitors to the Anne Frank [+You] exhibition will be invited to write lyrics & ideas on the Scribble Wall. Lines of Faith will then incorporate their contributions into a song ready for Holocaust Memorial Day, 27 January 2010. This would also form part of the 2010 programme for the European Year for Combating Poverty & Social Exclusion.

Book Promotion of the Diary of Anne Frank throughout Bristol Libraries.

From 20th April to 20th June, Bristol Libraries are holding a citywide reading promotion of Anne Frank's 'The Diary of a Young Girl'. Every library in the city will have multiple copies for loan: the full adult version, a children's version and, to reach the visually impaired community, a large print and a spoken word version. There are also children's biographies and other books of specific interest to young people.

City Conversations – Bristol People Talking.

During May, the new Museum about Bristol people and its history (opening in 2011) encourages discussion and dialogue between people of all backgrounds in response to the exhibition. How can we take forward the lessons raised about racism and our attitudes towards people of different faiths in the current local and global context? What will make a difference?
